
"LOVE DOESN'T COUNT CHROMOSOMES"

When Nour gave me the confirmation about the Down syndrome camp, I realized how much there was to do. The preparation of the camp took us some time, the whole team worked non-stop for weeks to make it happen. Everything was ready, and there we were : 8th of February, all gathered in Chabrouh for the same cause: bringing joy to our guests. By then, none of us expected the three amazing coming days. The team and I were all very nervous: new volunteers, a new doctor, 32 guests (boys and girls) and almost 100 people in the center. I remember staying up with Lamya and Loic all night figuring out the last details, and laughing at everything out of stress.

9th of February: all the worries and fears disappeared when the guests arrived. Two buses, coming from Antelias and Acsauvel got to Chabrouh with our favorite "downies", this is where it all started. After getting to know meet with the volunteers and assisting to a magic show, our guests had an awesome lunch. The activities came one after the other, and our guests participated to all of them with all the excitement of the world. Every night, we had a themed party in the dining room, turning into a "disco club" with a bar, music, costumes and a crazy atmosphere thanks to DJ Joe who spent this long weekend with us.

Every single minute of those four days was memorable, but what marked us the most was the spirit and the great vibes of the members: smiles all around, tears of joy and happiness, hugs and loads of love. It was all about emotion and spontaneity, when our guests were happy it was pure joy, when they fell in love it was true feelings and their emotions were contagious: good mood for everyone!





11th of February: already over. This camp passed by so quickly, but yet, we feel like we've known each other for years now. When you see the volunteers and the guests saying goodbye, when you see the sadness in their eyes, this is when you know this camp changed lives.

The last moments together were heartbreaking for everyone. When Raymond had to be taken to the bus, this discrete old man who was never emotional or explicit during the camp, he looked at Janice in the eyes and started screaming in tears, refusing to let go of her arm and afraid to be separated from her. This is just one example of how intense it was, especially that Down syndrome people are very emotional.

We all left the center with something different in our hearts but also in our minds, we gave from our energy and time but we earned so much in return: memories, friends and an amazing experience.




OUR CHILDREN « IL SUFFIT D'UN SOURIRE »







