Bringing Professionals to Chabrouh



ince I started the Chabrouh experience in 2002, learning first hand from the "founding generation" of volunteers from Germany I continued the service in many positions: volunteer, logistician, Group Leader, Masoul, and back to volunteer (in the 2015 "veteran camp"). Back then I could have never imagined to be one day a member of the professional staff of the Order of Malta, Malteser as we call them in Germany. Now, after 17 years of Chabrouh Camps experience, I moved with my family to Lebanon. I am trying to assist the Lebanese Association to bear their duties in helping the sick and the poor - far beyond the activities of the camps. Yet, Chabrouh stays my first home in Lebanon: nearly each and every team I try to visit, to see Dutch, British, French, Austrian, Spanish volunteers doing things the same way - or different but better since we did nearly two decades ago. Seeing this intimate service for the forgotten children "our Lords the sick" and comparing it with my professional work as humanitarian aid worker I often felt a disequilibrium.

With all our professional policies, measures, log frames and immense budgets: I missed the basic service and contact to those in need. I remember that in the middle ages the Grand Masters of the Order requested each Knight to serve one day per week in the Order's Hospital. Regardless of his higher ranks and duties, even the Grand Master himself insisted to lay down all privileges and shining armors to put on a simple robe, serving the poor and the sick.

So after a good planning and some discussions we were able to implement the first camp for "professionals" from both: German Malteser and Lebanese Association's HQ "Bureau Technique" in order to take a leave to serve our guests in Chabrouh. For our guests it meant one week of vacation, and for the overwhelming parts of the volunteers it meant a new understanding of what it could mean to dedicate their professional life for the Order's works. 37 Germans and 8 Lebanese enjoyed the camp and emphasized the three benefits: Joy for the Guests, self-dedication of the volunteers and new identification with the Order's activities..

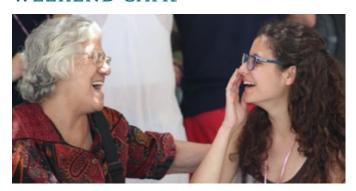

The volunteers support, help and care for the young handicapped. Together, they experience extraordinary activities like rock climbing, luging, partying and paragliding.

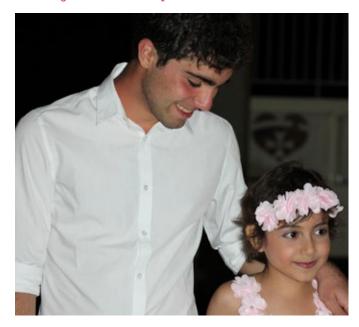

Lebanon on Wheels

Lebanon on Wheels is a fundraising initiative that aims to raise funds for the education and care of some of our disabled friends who live in different hospices in Lebanon. The project was founded in 2015 by two friends, George Varley and Auguste Breteau. The aim is to cycle across Europe and reach Lebanon in the hope that this might highlight a cause close to the heart and thus generate awareness as well as funds through an online fundraising platform. This proved to be a great success and Lebanon on Wheels was this year in its fourth year. The particularity this year was the participation of 3 Lebanese volunteers from the Youth!

'hen I first heard about the "Lebanon on Wheels" project I was kind of intrigued and impressed by this initiative, but never thought of actually doing it until Mivida suggested the idea to me. The challenge was what triggered me the most and the reward at the end was what I was waiting for. Volunteering with the Order has been an amazing experience for me whether on wheels, on foot or simply by heart and mind.
